The items they donated have made the room much more comfortable and cheerier. The new buzzword in education is "flexible seating" which I have been doing at CNS since 1994. (Eventually the other schools do catch up, but we will keep innovating.) The new seating also helps since our class has doubled in size since last year.

We will be starting our cooking/health & nutrition class after Labor Day and will have a mini kitchenette set up in the classroom. We also plan to start having the students eat in the area after that time and would love to have any parents who would like to join us for lunch from 12:30-12:55.

Modeling and reinforcing manners and kindness is important.
